FARM UPDATE

Spring is always a busy time on the farm ...

Spring time at Shawcroft Farm is always a busy time with our cows all calving in a 8 - 9 week period.

alving is coming to an end with about 70 cows still to give birth, it has gone well this year and the milking cows are out in the fields both day and night.

For 2021 we have had Ellie and Ben working with us, students at Reaseheath and Harper Adams respectively; they are on their placement years. We have also had vet students from Nottingham helping out in the calf shed and gaining dairy experience. It's great to work with a young enthusiastic team.

Much of the grassland on the farm is at a distance from the parlour; for this reason we only milk our cows once a day. They walk to the fields on

a network of recycled concrete railway sleepers. Henry manages the grazing and aims to give the cows a fresh field every day. We are always grateful to villagers informing us when there is anything unusual from cows out, fences down to leaking water tanks.

Spring 2021 has been a very special time

GOODBYES

Sadly in 2020 a number of our long term villagers passed away.



Ray Thompson 29.01.39 - 09.04.20

Ray was a Derby lad, great supporter of Derby County, played semi-professional football for Burton Albion and a member of Derby Rowing Club. He married Ann in May 1970 and after a working life as a Quantity Surveyor which took them travelling around the world, including working on several airports in Saudi Arabia, they moved back to Wootton in 1986. He embraced his life in Wootton and his love of sport could be seen again when he became the first Captain of Wootton Cricket Club.

Sadly he struggled with his health for several years but always maintained his infamous sense of humour. Unfortunately after a short spell in hospital he contracted Covid-19 and passed away on the 9th April 2020.

Ray would have been very proud that on the day of his funeral most of the village stood out to clap him on his last journey, a testament to how much he was loved by those in Wootton.



Terry Prior

Terry spent his formative life in London before moving to Scotland with family where he got to love the countryside. He joined the Merchant Navy at 16yrs old, travelled the world and then spent 4yrs with the RAF. He entered the teaching profession and also became a Mountaineering and Rock Climbing Instructor and a dedicated caver!

Terry and his wife, Betty, moved to Wootton and converted the barn at Fold Farm creating Fold Farm Cottage. In the latter years, sadly arthritis and ailing eyesight prevented him from pursuing another love, woodwork. He died two days before his scheduled heart operation at the age of 86yrs old having contracted covid.



Derek Salt 19.03.36 - 01.09.20

Wootton lost its longest serving resident, **Derek Salt**, at the age of 84.

He was the last person to remember services in the Chapel (now Chapel House) whilst he was a boy at Hole Farm where his parents farmed and took in evacuees during the war. It was one of the 10 farms in the village in the 1950s. He went on to run a haulage business before becoming a bus driver, a job he continued until lockdown at 84yrs old!

He was at least the third generation of that Salt family to live in the village, his grandparents ran a shop at Lane Cottage.



Nancy Barker 12.02.31 - 09.12.20

Nancy arrived in Wootton in 1952 with husband Frank to farm the 28 acres at Forge Farm. In the 1960s they moved to Fold Farm which had 80 acres and in the 70s to Shawcroft with 200 acres. In 1987 they moved to Dell View where she lost Frank in 2000 and finally retired in 2002

Alongside all the farming work and bringing up Ed and Dot she was a founder member and President of both Wootton WI and Wootton Cricket Club.

She was also a founder member of Ellastone Horse Show and Ellastone Bowls Club and remained active in the community right up to December 2020.

Nora Hartley whilst no longer in the village died on the same day as Nancy Barker.

Nora and her husband Ben moved to Distant Point, a former market garden, in mid 1960. She recalls how they used to bring turfs off the hills and heat them in the boiler house and how they grew carnations in the carnation house. She was a wealth of information about the history of the village and how Distant Point fitted in with life at the hall: an active member of the Women's Institute.

She maintained her independence, still climbing ladders at aged 82yrs and would be found at the bottom of Hall Lane waiting outside for the Community bus every Tuesday and Thursday come rain, snow or shine.

She left the village a few years ago to move nearer to her daughter Jacqueline in North Yorkshire.

Greg Shaw whilst no longer in the village, he used to live at White Cottage before moving to Ellastone, he passed away on the 4th April. He was the chairperson of Wootton Parish Council during the 1980s.

EGG BOX AT DISTANT POINT

If you take a wander down to the bottom of Hall Lane, look for Home Farm Cottage and you will find a little Egg Box House on the right-hand side. If you are lucky you will find some fresh free range eggs from Distant Point (located on Michael's Lane).





These are replenished on a weekly basis but they are popular so the phrase you 'snooze you lose' springs to mind.

If you find no eggs, leave a note with a contact number for the Egg Fairy to send you a message when it has been replenished.

FISHY TUESDAY

Most Tuesdays at 1.30pm there is a fish

van that visits the village. You will find him just outside Barbara's place, Cross Cottage.



Sometimes he does get delayed in getting to us and if that is the case he will phone to let us know and we try and get the message out to the fish regulars.

WOOTTON CALENDAR

For the past few years we have had a Wootton Calendar consisting of photographs that have been submitted by villagers with the winners being selected at a 'View & Vote' session during September. Sadly due to the pandemic we were unable to run the photograph competition so we have not got a 2021 edition. The calendar raises around £500 per year for the Ellastone and Mavfield First Responder and this was only possible as we managed to get the calendars printed free of charge by one of our villagers who had a printing company and even after leaving the village continued to print them. Unfortunately

given the impact of the pandemic it is not appropriate to ask them to continue.


We will need to discuss this further at the Parish Council meeting in May to establish if it is to continue for 2022.

THE READING ROOM

Since the demise of Wootton's WI the use of the Reading Room is now largely the quarterly Parish Council meetings and very occasional village events. There was a concern that the Reading Room may be disposed of so through representations to the Parochial Church Council by Ed Barker over a number of months, it was agreed that Wootton Parish Council would take over the on-



going use, management and upkeep. Whilst the Reading Room does not have some luxuries like a loo or running water it does provide Wootton with a space that we would like to encourage more use of. If any resident has any thoughts on how to utilise for the benefit of the community, please do not hesitate to have a chat with one of the Parish Councillors.

YEH...WE HAVE A DEFIBRILLATOR

The More observant villagers may have noticed that, thanks to our wonderful local community First Responders, we now have a new defibrillator located on the front wall of the Reading Room. We all hope that it will not be put to too much use in the future but it is comforting to know that it is there.

We need to emphasise that anyone needing to use the machine MUST dial 999 before opening the door of the defibrillator cabinet.

Once restrictions are lifted it is hoped that the First Responders will run another basic first aid training course for the residents of the village. Such a course was run a number of years ago and was well received by all those involved and having a refresher would be beneficial for all. We will provide more information about this opportunity when confirmed.
